Guests were then escorted to a stylish reception, where they enjoyed specialty cocktails and a five-course plated wine dinner. For close family and friends, an all-night post-reception "after party" followed, with more food, drinks and dancing until dawn.

CAKE Meyer lemon lavender cake with lemon buttercream.

FLOWERS Green roses, green "Kermit" chrysanthemums, eggplant calla lilies.

DÉCOR ELEMENTS The reception was styled to feel romantic and modern: drum lantern chandeliers hung over reception tables, and an

















outdoor lounge area featured low white seating, hanging lanterns and orchid centerpieces.
COLORS Celery, eggplant and white.
THEME Lavender. Fresh lavender bundles
were included with each invitation, sprigs of
lavender acted as place settings, the cake featured lavender flavors, and guests enjoyed a
signature lavender-blueberry martini created
by Sara and Tim.

UNIQUE DETAILS A custom walkway was built from the van drop-off area to the ceremony location so guests wouldn't get their heels stuck in the dirt as they walked to their seats. For wedding favors, the mother of the bride, Barb Phillips, sponsored an individual animal from Best Friends Animal Sanctuary in honor of each guest or couple invited to the wedding. Each guest received a letterpressed booklet with the name, picture and bio of the pet sponsored on their behalf, and a dog bone pendant engraved with the guest's name. A few guests even adopted their sponsored animals, following the wedding.

#### Most memorable moment

SARA'S ANSWER "There was a swirling-type wind, and you could hear faint growlings of thunder. Just as we were saying our vows, eagles were circling overhead, coasting on the thermals. But the weather never got bad, and as the ceremony ended the sun came out—it was beautiful."

TIM'S ANSWER "Seeing Sara come down the aisle for the first time in her dress—she looked so amazing and glowing. And being in that gorgeous setting among the vibrant aspens and mountains. It was an amazing start to a phenomenal party that lasted all night!"

## Embellish a Pittle

Forget simple, Plain-Jane wedding looks—for bridal gown designer Jane Wang, it's all about the details.

Ask Jane Wang where on a wedding dress she likes to add embellishments, and she'll tell you, "anywhere and everywhere." Known for her detailed gowns, Wang launched her first collection in 2006, and has since made a name for herself in the bridal fashion scene thanks to glamorous designs incorporating hand embroidery, Swarovski crystal beadwork and luxe fabrics like duchess silk satin, paperweight silk taffeta and French lace, including those from her Fall 2008 Collection. We caught up with Wang during a recent trunk show at Park City's White Couture Designer Bridal & Tuxedos (435-655-2943, whitecouture.com).

## Q. What's makes a Jane Wang wedding gown unique?

A. I use all my own embroidery designs, and I place embroidery and beading all over a gown—not just on the bodice, but also on the skirt or the train. I really like asymmetrical styles, so I like to create unexpected embroidery and beading designs and add them to unexpected places on a dress. All my dresses have built-in corsets, so a bride doesn't have to buy a separate underpinning. I also create custom veils in any style to match any dress. My personal favorite style is the fingertip veil.

# Q. What advice would you give brides searching for that perfect dress?

A. A gown should fit a bride's personality. That's the most important thing. Define your own personal style, then find a dress to match. For example, if you're a glamorous woman and like the look of Old Hollywood, you can pull off a more va-va-voom dress. But if that's not your personality, the dress could overwhelm you. Also, when you go shopping for a gown, don't bring all of your relatives. Too many opinions will only confuse you, and you'll get lost and frustrated. Just bring one good friend who knows you well.

## Q. What trends will we see for bridal fashions this season?

A. Dresses will be very detailed.

I think beading will make a big comeback. I'm seeing paillettes of all shapes and sizes—and they're bold. And I see the bow as an important element again, but not the bows of the past in traditional shapes or placements (the bad bows we all would like to forget). This time, bows will be asymmetrical in shape, designed to have a special drape or fold, and used in unexpected places to make them modern and unique.
